

MOTOR VEHICLE CRASH SAFETY TIPS FROM THE GRR FIRE DEPARTMENT

If you are involved in a motor vehicle crash:

- 1. Do you see fire? Do you smell smoke or gasoline?
- 2. Do a quick injury check:
 - a. Are you hurt? Able to get out of the vehicle?
 - b. Is anyone else hurt?
- 3. If you see fire or smell smoke or gasoline and are able to walk:
 - a. Turn off the engine.
 - b. Get out of the vehicle.
 - c. Help others out of the vehicle if possible.
 - d. Move to a safe place upwind from the vehicle, then...

4. CALL 911!

- 5. If the weather is bad and there is no fire, smoke, or smell of gasoline:
 - a. Consider remaining in the vehicle with activated emergency flashers **if** the vehicle is not in a traffic lane and conditions allow.
- 6. If the vehicle is in a traffic lane:
 - a. Activate the emergency flashers.
 - b. Exit the vehicle and find a safe place to wait for help.
 - i. To the side and behind the vehicle.
 - ii. Uphill and upwind if possible.
- 7. Set out LED road flares or other warning devices if available.
- 8. What happens next?
 - a. If there are no injuries, no fire, no leaking fluids:
 - i. The 911 operator will dispatch Montana Highway Patrol.
 - ii. The officer will offer to contact a towing company if needed, but the vehicle owner does have the right to choose and contact their preferred towing service.
 - b. If there are injuries, fire, the smell of smoke, or gasoline or fluid leakage:
 - i. The 911 operator will dispatch the fire department, an ambulance, and Montana Highway Patrol
 - ii. Assist others injured in the crash if you are able.

If you are the first to come upon a motor vehicle crash:

- 1. Stop a safe distance behind the crashed vehicle, out of the line of traffic.
 - a. Park uphill and upwind depending on conditions.
- 2. Activate your emergency flashers.

3. Call 911.

- a. If you do not have phone service to reach 911:
 - i. Do a quick scene assessment (number of vehicles involved, are there injuries?) and move to a location where you have phone service; or
 - ii. Ask another passerby or a passenger in your vehicle to go to a location where there is cell service.
- b. Accurate location information is critical to 911.
- 4. Help crash victims to the extent you are able.
- 5. Set out LED road flares or other warning devices if available.
- 6. When emergency vehicles arrive:
 - a. Be prepared to move your vehicle as emergency personnel direct.
 - b. Be prepared to stay at the scene to provide information about the crash to law enforcement.

Suggested vehicle emergency tools:

- 1. 4- or 5-pound fire extinguisher.
- 2. Window glass breaker with seatbelt cutter.
- 3. A working flashlight. A headlamp is strongly suggested.
- 4. A set of flashing LED road flare lights.
 - a. Avoid pyrotechnic road flares—they are a fire hazard.
- 5. Roadside emergency kit.
- 6. Gloves: tear/puncture-resistant work gloves and nitrile industrial gloves.
- 7. Extra cold weather protection during the winter (for example: hats, warm gloves).
- 8. Reflective high-visibility lightweight emergency vest.
