

SAFETY TIPS FROM THE GRR FIRE DEPARTMENT July 2022

The wildland fire season is year-round in our area. While June was green with few fires, drying in July will ramp up the danger. Cheat grass dries faster than other grasses and is very flammable.

Parched grasses and other fuels burn hot and fast, especially on hot, windy days. "Red Flag Days" are the most hazardous. While grills are OK to use, avoid open fires in pits unless they are covered by spark-retarding screens.
